B. C. O. INAUGURAL PLANNED

HORNETS WIN FIVE STRAIGHT

The Lew Wallace football team has illustrated its possibilities in the past five weeks by buzzing to five straight victories over their opponents and building up a total of 44 points while holding their opponents to 13 points.

The Hornets inaugurated their grid season by rolling over Tolleston, 6-0, with "Hurryin' Henry" Stram circling his own right end for the score. The following week, Parker High School, from the Windy City found the Hornet sting to be a severe one and were trounced 7-0, when again the sleek Hornet halfback struck paydirt by rounding his own left end.

Our next victims were from the Sucker State. Joliet Central of Joliet, Illinois, found the Northern Hoosiers from Glen Park to be too rough and were downed 13-6. The first touchdown occured when Stram took the opening kickoff of the second half and streaked through the entire Joliet team for the score. Minutes later, Bud Manion hit his own right guard and scored standing up. This completed a sustained drive from mid-field. Joliet scored in the closing minutes of the game, due to a remarkable pass attack which ended when McHugh, a Joliet halfback, hit his left tackle for the score.

The Horace Mann-Lew Wallace gridiron rivalry was closed for 1940 when the Hornet eleven trampled the Horsemen, 12-7. Wallace scored their touchdowns in the first half. Both scores resulted from steady drives of the Glen Park aggregation. Stram and Manion sparked the Hornet offensive and scored consecutively in the first and second quarters.

The following week our proud Hornet eleven broke a five year tradition by setting back the Senators from East Chicago 6-0. In preceding years the Wallace Hornets have built up a winning streak of four consecutive victories and then lost
