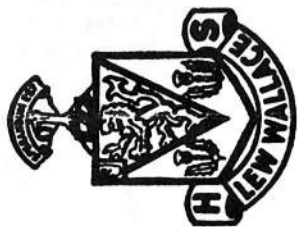

Eighteen New Teachers Supplement Staff

This year our faculty includes eighteen teachers who were not here last year. Three of them, Mrs. Mary Sewell of the guidance department, Mr. Alred Fissinger, music teacher, and Mr. Tom Carpenter, who recently served in the Peace Corps, are already familiar to many of us, for they are returning after absences of a year or more.

In addition there are fifteen teachers this year who are new to the school. Two new members of the English department, Miss Joan Hydo and Mrs. Eleanor Chabreja, are not completely "green" here though, as both graduated from Wallace. Miss Hydo, who also teaches beginning French, is here after attending Indiana University where she majored in language arts. She enjoys horses, painting and reading, and warns her students that one of her major dislikes is people who chew gum in class. Mrs. Chabreja also went to Indiana University where she also majored in language arts.

Other new teachers this year are strangers to Wallace, although three of them have had previous teaching experience in Gary. Mr. John Valenti taught at Horace Mann for eight years. Having degrees from Ball State and Indiana University, he is teaching the electricity course in the industrial arts

department. With degrees from North Carolina State and previous experience at Frankfort, Indiana, and Froebel, Mr. William Kukoy is teaching health, safety, and driver's training here this year. He gives as his first impression of Wallace "the friendliness of everyone connected with the school." Having attended Marquette University, Mr. Daniel Dyman comes to us after three years at Andrean. He is teaching biology and biophysical science and anticipates "a successful year of progress in education."

The remaining new staff members have a wide variety of teaching experience and interests.

Mr. Mike Chipperfield is teaching art after majoring in that subject at Nebraska's Chadron State.

Mr. Greg Kaul is the new radio director. Coming from Indiana State, he is impressed by the fact that "students seem friendly and helpful to someone new to the faculty."

This year's addition to the mathematics department, Mr. Joe Bohlin, attended the U.S. Air Force Academy and Northern Illinois University where he majored in math and Slavic languages. His hobbies are sports and reading, and his pet peeve is chalk dust.

Stand Up And Be Counted

Last year the Student Council revised the method of selecting the homecoming court. Previously all voting Council members and the senior members of the football team voted for the court. A committee was formed by the Council and it revised the system so that every senior could vote, and every senior girl would be eligible to be a member of the court. The committee decided to have the voting take place in the main gym during both lunch hours, and to make voting voluntary. It was decided that the seniors could make their own decisions as to whether they wanted to vote or not. Therefore a vote by homeroom was overruled.

Only 130 seniors (fifty boys and eighty girls) voted this year. There the 212 girls and 254 boys, a total of 466 seniors. Yet only 28% of the class cast their ballots for the court. Since bulletins were sent to the teachers and the news of the elections was posted on the bulletin board outside of 100M, the lack of votes cannot be attributed to lack of publicity.

In this election year of 1964 we should all become aware of the need to take an interest in the affairs that are happening around us, not only those nationally, but also those here at school. It is the right of every American to be able to stand up and be counted and we should begin in school, for school is the training ground for our adult lives. One way of becoming good adult citizens is first to be good school citizens!

French III X Student Journeys To France; Learns Customs And Languages Of People

"It was marvelous!" is how Amy Pruitt (2) described her trip to France this summer.

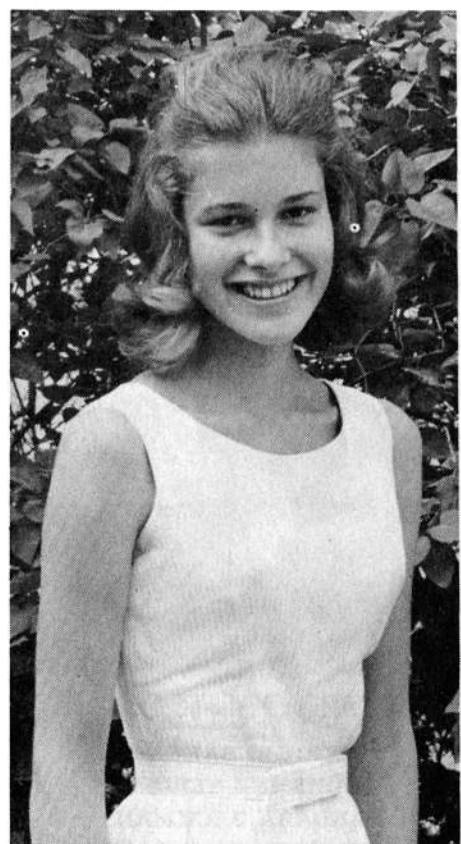
Twenty-nine Indiana high school students majoring in French participated in a program sponsored by Indiana University to further student knowledge of the French language and people.

Amy attended classes five days a week for three hours in the mornings, and one and a half hours in the afternoon, three days a week. During her stay, she spoke only French, and found it difficult to speak English when she came home. Amy feels that her knowledge of French culture was greatly improved.

Two different families in St. Brieuc, Brittany, were her hosts during her nine and a half week stay in France. She feels that the French are Americanized in their dress except that the girls never wear shorts. Incidentally, French girls do not start dating until the age of eighteen. Teenagers go sailboating, play bridge, and go to the beach. They like American records and listen to the Beatles a great deal.

She was impressed with the warmth and friendliness of the French. They were eager to know about life in the U. S.

On her last night in France she toured Paris and saw Mont St. Michel, the

Linda Richiger 1958 Grad, Wins Wilson Fellowship

Linda Richiger, 1958 alumna of Lew Wallace, recently received a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship to further her education after graduating from Indiana University in 1962.

Indiana ranks fifteenth nationally in the number of secondary school graduates who later in life won Woodrow Wilson Fellowships, according to an educational survey released.

The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation recently studied the secondary school origins of students elected to its Fellowships since 1958 and found that 140 of them received their high school training in Indiana.

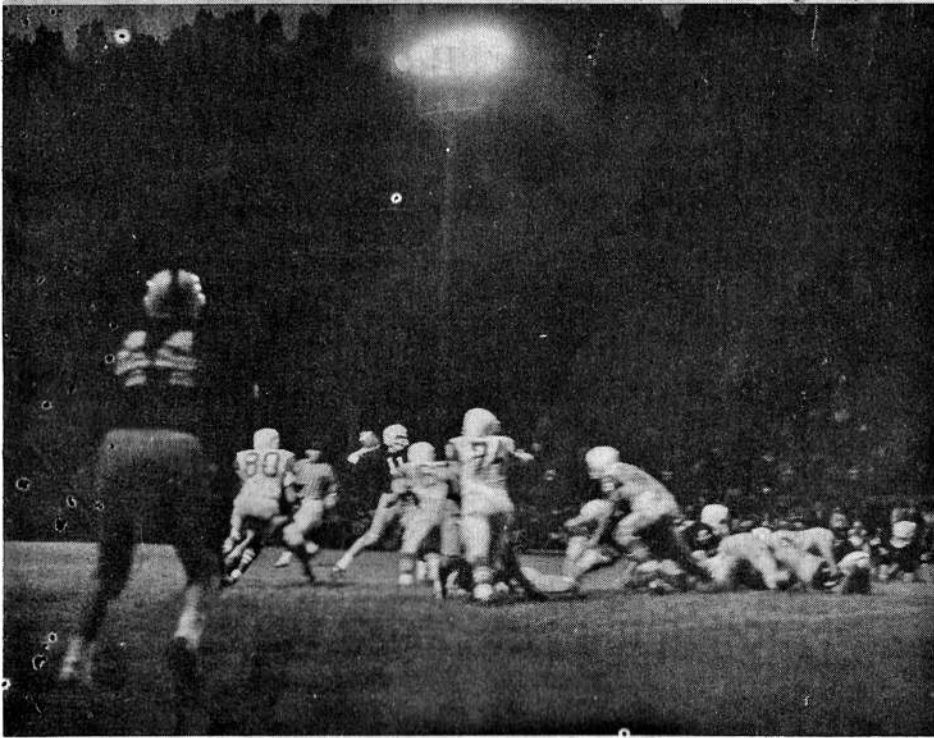

Hornets Defeat Vikings In 11th Straight Win

The mighty Hornets did it again! The Vikings of Valparaiso are still looking for a win after their 11th straight loss to the Hornets.

The first quarter was uneventful, but the second period started with an intercepted pass and a blocked punt by George Kos. This set Wallace up for a 47 yard run by Tom Miller. Kos converted for the extra point.

Late in the second quarter the Hornets scored again on a 7 yard pass from Skip Lazzaro to Tom Thomas. Kos again kicked the extra point.

After going scoreless in the third period, the Hornets rallied in the fourth quarter when halfback Stan Horvath carried the pigskin six yards for Wallace's last touchdown. Kos converted for the extra point.

Netmen Anticipate Exceptional Season

After experiencing a first place tie with Horace Mann and a third place standing in the conference last year, this year's tennis team, composed mostly of juniors and seniors, is expected to be stronger.

"The Lew Wallace tennis team of 1964 has both the ability and experience to take the city and conference championships this year," said Coach Nick Day.

The first practice sessions for the Lew Wallace Netmen were held last week. Elimination matches took place at Gleason Park to determine the positions on the team.
